1 Seahorses are very strange fish.

They have no stomachs so they have to eat all the time. They do this by sucking up small sea animals, such as shrimps, with their noses.

They move through the water 'standing' almost straight up. The fins on the seahorses backs wave to push them along and their tails act like a rudder.

Their eyes does not move in the same direction together, so one eye can look behind and the other to the front at the same time.

The female lays her eggs, then swims off, the male seahorse looks
after the eggs inside a flap on his front side for two weeks.
