Dear Parents/Carers,

It was wonderful to see so many parents on Monday and Wednesday of this week for Lower School and Upper School parents' evening respectively. I would like to pass on my thanks to all those who completed the questionnaire which is based on the Ofsted model questions on Parent View. The questionnaires will be analysed over the next few weeks and I will share the results of the survey in due course.

Parents' evening highlights the partnership that is required between parents and school in helping children to progress to the very best of their ability. With this in mind it is important that all adults model to children that learning is a lifelong passion and something that never stops. This can be done in a number of ways. For example:





to how it did this morning?

- Talk to your child about what you are learning about at the moment.
- Read books, newspapers and magazines in front of your child.
- If you cannot answer a question that your child asks you (which very often happens to me when my niece asks me about the intricacies of space, i.e. how many stars are there in the galaxy? How far would you have to dig to get to the centre of the Earth? Or, when can I go to the moon?), research the answer together and show your child that you are curious to find out the answer.
- Model asking questions and then finding out the answers, i.e. as you walk through the park, ask aloud: What do you think that squirrel is eating? In Autumn, why do some leaves turn red, while others turn yellow? Why does my shadow look different

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Our staff have a number of training days each year and two hours of in service training each week. As I said, *learning is a lifelong passion and something that never stops.*

Parents of Year 6 Pupils

Families with children due to start secondary school in September 2023 (i.e. those children born between 1 September 2011 and 31 August 2012) are now able to apply online for secondary school places. The deadline for applications is 31 October 2022 and places will be offered on 1 March 2023.

It is particularly important that families carefully consider the school's admission criteria and name at least one school on their application where their child would have been offered a place in previous years. Please be aware of the deadline as parents who apply late are less likely to be offered one of their preferred schools.

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
Nursery/Reception Places for September 2022

Lower School



Lifesize Baby Animals - Sophy Henn

Following on from Lifesize Animals and Lifesize Dinosaurs, Lifesize Baby Animals does exactly what it promises and over the course of its 32 oversized pages, shows the actual size of real-life babies, from tiny baby possums (the size of a full stop) to gargantuan baby blue whales (the size an ambulance at birth). The illustrations are attractive and often portray the animals within their natural habitats. The text is accessible and clear, suitable from 3+, and introduces basic information, combined with engaging questions. Reading this book will prompt a chorus of oohs and aahs! A nice finishing touch is the final page, which shows a summary of each baby and adult creature with is length shown in 'lifesize books' and an invitation to measure yourself in books to see how you compare - this could make an excellent maths link, measuring out bears, elephants and whales on the floor. Lifesize Baby Animals is a beautiful book which would be invaluable whilst your child is learning a topic on lifecycles/growth in school.



Upper School

Paper Boat, Paper Bird - David Almond & Kirsti Beautyman

From the author of Skellig, the story of Paper Boat, Paper Bird is an unlikely tale of finding friendship in unlikely places. When Mina and her mother travel to Japan, the unfamiliar language and intriguing sights fuel her imagination, especially when she is gifted an origami boat and bird by a kind woman on the bus. When Mina decides to write a message on her new origami gift and leaves it on a river in the temple gardens, she couldn't predict that it would find its way to a young boy who was in need of a friend of his own. Easy-to-read, with striking black, white and red illustrations, Paper Boat, Paper Bird is a perfect addition to your child's bookcase. Anyone who has travelled will understand the wonder and hope that comes with visiting a new place and discovering its wonders, and the reader feels this through Mina and her own journey in Japan. David Almond's poetic storytelling also allows for readers to touch on what could otherwise be difficult topics: the loss of a parent, dealing with life changes, new members to a family. Kirsti Beautyman's illustrations add to the layers of meaning



beautifully. I particularly liked that this was not a long book and that it was broken up by the wonderful illustrations: many children can find reading daunting, however the layout and structure of the story makes this book accessible to most children in KS2 and is perfect for those that are transitioning from smaller picture books.

Mr Slinn's Artists of the Week



Mihran Y1.2

In Year 1 the children have been learning about tints and shades. They learnt how to makes tints of a colour by adding white and shades of a colour by adding black. Mihran created multiple tints and shades of the colour blue very well and applied the paint very carefully to his work.

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Laiba Y5.2

In Year 5 the children have been learning about the Rococo style. They learnt that Rococo art tends to show everyday life and often features natural forms including leaves and plants. The children had a go at copying some examples of Rococo patterns and the outcomes were very impressive. Laiba produced an excellent piece of work with great attention to detail.
