Dear Parents/Carers,



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Mighty Mountains Geography Workshops

On Wednesday, Year 5 took part in two Geography workshops to support their Geography topic 'Mountains'. In the morning, they took part in the Mighty Mountains where pupils learnt how you climb a mountain, what special clothes and equipment you would need to take with you (and looking at them in real life!), what it feels like to climb a mountain, why mountains can be dangerous places, mountain wildlife and the mountain environment. This was followed by a Map Skills and Mini-Orienteering workshop on the school site. In this workshop they explored OS Maps, learnt how to measure distance with their steps/paces, and took part in a mini-orienteering challenge using a specially drawn map of the school and their new skills to find as many hidden flags as they can!

Quidditch Day

On Tuesday of this week, Year 4, 5 and 6 pupils had a Quidditch Day. The day began with a Sorting Hat Assembly, where children were placed in the four Hogwarts houses. Following this, each class had a 30-minute Quidditch lesson, led by Quidditch coaches. The day concluded with a trophy presentation. Children thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

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Projects


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Mr Panichi's Book of the Week

Lower School



Egyptian Myths - Jean Menzies and Katie Ponder (illustrator)

Egyptian Myths is a brilliant book about ancient civilisations. It looks stunning; with its black cover and golden spine, and is packed with stories from Egypt, which have been retold in a way which is accessible to younger readers. The stories have their fair share of mythical creatures, terrible consequences and gruesome endings, all of which are completely captivating to read and perfect to share aloud. The illustrations are rich in colour and pay homage to hieroglyphics in their style, but are slightly cartoonesque too, enabling children to grasp some of the quite complicated ancient plot lines and characters. Author Jean Menzies has organised put the stories into categories, which also help the target audience to navigate the book. There are chapters devoted to gods, pharaohs and even one on 'mortals'. The final chapter is most useful, as it gives the reader a series of double page infographics which detail some of the historical content; such as mummification and 'the journey of the dead'. These are brightly coloured and far more appealing than most glossaries. The final spread is a list of Egyptian vocabulary with anglicised pronunciation underneath (which will be invaluable to most children and parents too!).

Upper School

Resist – Tom Palmer

This is a magnificent historical fiction set during World War II in the village of Velp near Arnhem; it is loosely based on the childhood story of Audrey Hepburn. 15 year old Edda (Audrey) is frightened and increasingly hungry, but she shows immense courage in undertaking small actions of resistance against the Nazi occupiers. Like most Dutch citizens, Edda's family has been traumatised by the war: her uncle was killed by the Germans as retribution for the actions of saboteurs; her brother Alex is in hiding because Dutch young men were abducted and sent to work as virtual slave labour in Germany; her other brother lan is 17 so should be young enough to be safe – but is he? And why is Edda's mother on a list of locals that are 'not to be trusted'? What will Edda do if Allied paratroopers arrive in Arnhem to liberate the population – but end up underestimating German military power? This is a story of resistance and hope in the face of oppression which seems especially timely given recent events in Ukraine. Palmer is a genius at using crisp, clear language to create vivid scenes and evoke tension, so with my English teacher's hat on, it is top-notch. It is also a Barrington Stoke novel, meaning that it is accessible for the reluctant and struggling readers. It is brilliant for children in Year 4 who want a challenging read, and any other older child.



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Mr Slinn's Artists of the Week

In Year 2 the children have been learning about Henri Matisse. The children then created their own collages in a style similar to that of the artist using a range of different colour shapes.
