Dear Parents/Carers,

Although it was a very long day, on Monday myself, Mr Matthews and Mrs Pannu were privileged to make a special visit to observe teaching and learning at Michaela School in London. Michaela's last Progress 8 score placed them 5th best school in the country. Its headteacher, Katherine Birbalsingh, is a leading voice in education internationally.

Michaela does things differently. It is an Outstanding school and gives the following as one of the reasons why:

'Our desks are in rows and the teacher stands at the front of the class and leads the children to new and exciting destinations. This requires sharp explanations, checking for understanding, and a belief that the teacher is the authority in the classroom.'

It is often referred to as the 'strictest' school in the country. However, our visit highlighted how, at Michaela, staff have cultivated an ethos of kindness allied to high expectations for learning behaviours:

'Because without excellent discipline, learning cannot take place. Pupils at Michaela feel they are treated fairly and justly. Thanks to our high expectations, it means that learning can flourish.'

At William Murdoch Primary School we are committed to providing the very best we can for our children. In order to do this, we are equally committed to learning and improving on our best efforts by building on best practice.



NEU Strike Action

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Mr Panichi's Book of the Week

Omar, The Bees And Me - Helen Mortimer& Katie Cottle (Illustrator)

A spring-infused delight of a story, where two children rally the whole community in creating a bee corridor to help encourage local wildlife, while celebrating their cultural diversity and customs. As with any good picture book, there are so many layers to this book. The main theme throughout is that of sustainability. The children of Class One encourage the members of their community to plant wild flowers in order to boost the numbers of bees in the area. They help deliver envelopes of seeds to all the houses between the school and park. This book helps children understand


how vital bees are in order to pollinate and provide food. It will inspire children to think about how they can create bee corridors in their local community too. Katie Cottle's illustrations bring another layer of vibrancy to the story. They radiate warmth and joy. There are also other aspects of story that can be explored, such as developing friendship and cultural identity. When Omar brings honey cake to Show and Tell and explains that his grandpa used to keep bees 'a long way away' among the 'apricot trees and jasmine bushes', it sparks the idea of creating a bee corridor - but, more than that, it brings an opportunity for Maisie and Omar to connect and build a friendship. The end pages are gorgeous and filled with essential bee facts and a recipe for a delicious honey cake.

This book is perfect for all children to explore and a great starting point for so much learning.

Chocolate Milk, X-Ray Specs & Me! - Bethany Walker & Jack Noel (illustrator)

Freddy Spicer is at home while his parents, international sprout farmers, are away in Outer Costanga (which is so far away Freddy can't even find it on a map). Freddy is with his grandfather and at a new school where he has trouble making friends and is also secretly in love with Samira. A strange lady has moved in next door and captivated Grandpa; it looks like a wedding is on the cards. Freddy has also accidentally blown up the shed with a blast gun he thinks his parents left for his birthday. All he really wants to do is go to Blast Yourself Bonkers and hopefully gain friends; but his parents have not returned in time. This story is told in the form of letters, from Freddy and his parents and also some of the other characters. What the reader knows, but Freddy remains clueless



about, is that his parents are not actually sprout farmers but secret agents on the tail of the mastermind criminal Dr Alpha Bett. This is the joke of the book, that Freddy never realises what is going on and yet somehow manages to save the day by accident. I generally do not find books for

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children particularly funny, though this is one of the exceptions because it is very cleverly written; I laughed my way through this book because the reader can see what is going to happen and Freddy remains engagingly unaware. The book is delightfully doodled and illustrated by Jack Noel in much the same way as Freddy would have done and this adds to the joy of the letters and postcards he sends.
