MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents/Carers,

On Monday, myself and the two deputy headteachers, Mr Matthews and Mrs Pannu, had the privilege of attending the launch of the Walkthrus programme coordinated by Birmingham Education Partnership, the body responsible for school improvement in Birmingham schools. Supporting teacher development to ensure we have the most effective practitioners has always been a school focus. The Walkthrus techniques use an evidence-informed approach to develop teachers' understanding of how children learn and how to use the most effective teaching strategies. Our upcoming teacher training days will focus on Walkthrus and we couldn't be more excited to be involved. We believe Walkthrus will be a key cog in our continuous school improvement journey and help us further improve pupil outcomes.

Dylan William, emeritus professor of Educational Assessment at the Institute of Education, University of London has this to say on Walkthrus:

It is a beautifully illustrated tour of the most important things to be thinking about in teaching, and in the leadership of teaching. Teaching is such a complex endeavour that the idea of a complete guide to teaching excellence is surely impossible, but this comes closer than anything I have seen to date.

Industrial Action on Tuesday 2 May 2023

I am writing to inform you about the next day of industrial action by the National Education Union (NEU), one of the main teaching trade unions. <u>This will take place on Tuesday 2 May 2023.</u>

To determine whether William Murdoch Primary School can remain fully or partially open, a detailed risk assessment has been conducted. This considers the impact that the action will have on the health and safety of pupils, staff and visitors, and whether the school can run a full or amended curriculum, to determine whether it is possible to operate the school safely during the strike.

Due to the implications of industrial action, various activities of the school are being changed and amended, including classes being closed. As head teacher, in discussion with senior leaders, and based on the information I have at hand, it has been decided to <u>close Class Y3.3. No other classes</u> <u>will be closed.</u>

If there are any changes regarding which classes are in school, you will be notified on Class Dojo and by text.

If your child is affected by these changes and is entitled to Free School Meals (not Universal Free School Meals), please contact the Main Office if you would like to order and collect a packed lunch.

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Orders should be made by 9.15am on Tuesday at the latest. For those children who are in school, lunchtimes will run as usual.

I would like to again express my appreciation of your cooperation and understanding at this time.

Nursery Play & Stay Session

This week the Nursery parents were invited to attend a 'Singing and Rhyme Time' Stay and Play session with their children. During the session, parents had the opportunity to learn about the importance of singing and rhyme in the Early Years and how it supports many aspects of children's early development. Parents were then able to experience their child take part in a 'Sound Tots' singing session and were given ideas to engage in rhyme at home.

Eid Assembly and Parties

I hope families celebrating Eid had a great time marking the occasion. A special Eid assembly will be held on Thursday 5 May 2023 at 9.00am in the Upper School hall by the children and staff in Reception. We would like to invite parents of children in Reception to watch the assembly. All children will

have the opportunity to take part in Eid parties next Thursday afternoon. Please look out for the Eid letter where we will provide further details.

Please note, for assemblies taking place in the Upper School hall, access to the assembly will be via the Upper School hall doors only.

Attendance

Our whole school attendance is currently 92.8% which is well below the national average 93.6% and school target of 97%. It is also well below William Murdoch Primary School's pre-covid 19 attendance figures. We fully understand that children can become unwell but we do ask that you please send your child in if you think they are able to cope with the school day. Please avoid taking holidays during term time. We have 35 children who are yet to miss any time from school this year. We have 137 children who fall into the persistently absent category as set by the government. Children who are referred to as persistently absent are children with attendance which falls below 90%. Across a year that would mean a child misses 4 weeks of school. If absence is persistent or holidays are taken, you could be fined under section 444 of the 1996 Education Act.

Community News

As you are aware, from time to time we send home leaflets for a variety of things including notices from the wider community. Can we reiterate this is **not an endorsement** from the school for any of the products, events or services, and we must emphasise that you must carry out your own checks

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to validate any of the information. If you are interested in something advertised through the school, please contact the relevant parties for further information. The exception to the above is any after school clubs or holiday clubs that take place on the school premises. The school ensures that these providers adhere to the school's safeguarding procedures.

Wellbeing Tip of the Week - Don't let exam stress get to you

Mr Parker in the London Marathon

On Sunday 23 April 2023, Mr Parker took part in the London Marathon. A marathon is 26.2 miles which is roughly the distance from Handsworth to Warwick. Mr Parker completed the marathon in 2 hours 41 minutes, averaging 6.05 minutes per mile and finishing 728th out of 49,000+ finishers. Mr Parker was raising money for Cruse Bereavement, the UK's leading bereavement charity. Thanks to the support of so many, he raised over £1200. A massive well done from all at William Murdoch Primary School.

New Catering Arrangements

The new catering arrangements have begun, and I am pleased to confirm that our school catering service will

continue to offer a toast facility during morning breaktime for our Upper School pupils only. **Payment for toast can only be made through your child's ParentPay account.** Toast must be purchased in full for each half-term priced at:

Toast - £6.00 per half-term (20p per day). Cheese on Toast - £12.00 per half-term (40p per day). Payment for toast must be made by the first Friday of each half-term.

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School Playground Equipment

As the weather begins to pick up, I would like to remind parents that everyone should be off site at the end of the school day by 3.40pm. This is so that our after-school clubs can use the playgrounds and play equipment. Please note the gates will close automatically at **3.40pm due to the new access controls.**

We know many parents like to allow their children on the equipment at the end of the school day, but the children MUST be adequately supervised by their parents or carers.

Do you have a child who is four or will turn four before 31 August 2023?

If so, you should have already applied online for them to start school in September. Normal applications have now closed so if you have not applied you should contact admissions at Birmingham City Council immediately to make a late application. You must tell them if you already have a child at William Murdoch Primary School (who will still be attending in September 2023). You do get priority but only if you have actually applied and told them about the sibling connection!



SchoolGrid Account

If your child's SchoolGrid account is still showing 'in credit' as of Monday 17 April 2023, parents are to contact SchoolGrid directly on <u>01506 300310</u> or via <u>support@schoolgrid.co.uk</u> who will be able to arrange a refund for you.

We ask that parents settle all SchoolGrid outstanding balances as soon as **possible.** SchoolGrid (Dolce) will continue to chase any outstanding payments until they have been paid in full.




Pupils across the school have looked at article 6 (life, survival and development) - Every child has the right to life. Governments must do all they can to ensure that children survive and develop to their full potential.


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Upper School

The children of Y3.2




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Pupil of the Week
