Dear Parents/Carers,

It has been an incredibly busy term that has simply flown by. The Spring term is the engine room of the academic year, where the children have settled in and tend to make the most progress. The Spring term has also seen so many wonderful events take place, including showcasing the children's fabulous artwork during the Parents' Evenings, and more recently the Services For Education Music Ensemble which saw our talented musicians perform at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire. There have also been numerous sporting events taking place where William Murdoch Primary School pupils have shown great teamwork and sportsmanship.

Year groups have also enjoyed some delightful educational trips and visits this Spring term, with Year 4 visiting Warwick Castle and Year 1 going to Tutbury Castle. The children also experienced a range of workshops as the school has marked World Book Day, Safer Internet Day and Science Week this term. We have also had an Ancient Greeks workshop in Year 3, a Dinosaur workshop in Nursery and a Fire Safety workshop for pupils in Year 4.

New Site Arrangements – Office Move

This week, I had a number of meetings with the architects and building contractors, and I am delighted to confirm that the new Main Office will be operational for when we return after the Easter break on Monday 17 April 2023. This also means the path that links Antrobus Road to the Top Playground, and runs behind the Year 6 classrooms, will be reopened.

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I would like to pass on my thanks for your patience and support during the period of the building works. We very much look forward to welcoming you into these spaces and I hope you are as pleased with the new facilities as we are.

Do you have a child who is four or will turn four before August 31 2023?

If so you should have already applied online for them to start school in September. Normal applications have now closed so if you have not applied you should contact admissions at Birmingham City Council immediately to make a late application. You must tell them if you already have a child at William Murdoch Primary School (who will still be attending in September 2023). You do get priority but only if you have actually applied and told them about the sibling connection!

Year 1 Visit to Tutbury Castle

On Wednesday 29 March 2023, the children in Year 1 visited Tutbury Castle, as part of their Kings and Queens topic this term. Tutbury Castle is a largely ruined medieval castle, owned by the Duchy of Lancaster. In the morning, the children walked to St Mary's Priory Church, where they met Queen Elizabeth I. Pupils learnt the rich history of Tutbury Castle and had the opportunity to display their knowledge and ask questions. In the afternoon, children were given a guided tour of the grounds, which was enjoyed by all. Behaviour throughout was exemplary - children were a credit to the school. They should be very proud of themselves, as we are of them.



Little History Quiz

On Wednesday 29 March 2023, Mr Hallam took four pupils from Year 6 (Hassan, JB, Taemar and Rayyan) to King Edward VI Camp Hill School for Boys for their annual Little History quiz. Over 9 challenging rounds, the team answered questions about kings and queens, inventors, famous faces and ancient adventures. They competed against 27 teams from other schools in the Birmingham area and finished in a fantastic 4th position. It was great to see the pupils showing off their impressive History knowledge, and it really is a wonderful achievement to finish so high on the leaderboard!

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Easter Egg Rolling Competition

UNICEF Article of the Week

This week's article of the week has focused on World Water Day, which takes place every year on 22 March. Pupils have learnt that World Water Day is an annual United Nations observance which started in 1993 and raises awareness of the 2 billion people currently living without access to safe, clean water and good sanitation. This was Sustainable Development Goal 6.

But there is still much work to be done with over 2 billion people drinking unsafe water. An important aim of World Water Day is to inspire everyone to act and make the necessary changes so that the right to clean water can be achieved by 2030 for everyone.

This week's activities were linked to the following articles:



Article 24 (Health Services): Every child has the right to the best possible health. Governments must provide good quality health care, clean water, nutritious food, and a clean environment and education on health and well-being so that children can stay healthy. Richer countries must help poorer countries achieve this.

Article 27 (Adequate Standard of Living): Every child has the right to a standard of living that is good enough to meet their physical and social needs and support their development. Governments must help families who cannot afford to provide this.

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Book of the Week

Lower School




Rapunzel – Bethan Woollvin

A pared back and twisted take on the traditional tale told with humour to be gleaned from reading the pictures. It begins with Rapunzel, here portrayed as a child, already encased in the tower without the back story explaining how she came to be there and reaches a conclusion in which she makes a joyful escape without the aid of a prince. As in her previous book Little Red, Bethan Woollvin uses a colour palette which incorporates only one standout colour amongst black, white and grey — in this case a golden yellow used to highlight Rapunzel's hair. A really great storybook that will help young children to see things differently.

Upper School

The Song Walker – Zillah Bethell

The Song Walker is a soulful story that beautifully serenades the reader with themes of freedom, identity, music and heritage. Zillah Bethell's writing always takes readers to new horizons. The Song Walker is a new standalone adventure that shares a similar intensity of setting and an interweaving of gentle existentialist musings with relatable themes of making friendships and searching for identity in the face of cultural and familial expectations. This time, the setting is the Australian Outback and the reader feels the blazing heat and dryness of the red, flat landscape that spans underneath a limitless sky. The main character, who is nameless at the start of the story, appears to have no idea how she got there or who she is. She carries a mysterious case and finds herself on a search for answers accompanied by her new friend, Tarni. Journeying deeper into the desert landscape, the girl has to dig deep into her inner self to find answers about who she is and who she wants to be. The story is philosophical and at times dream-like, with a melodic quality to the writing. The book is perfect for mature readers in upper Key Stage 2 who enjoy an immersive reading experience and a thought-provoking narrative with the potential to stir some very profound discussion questions.



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Artist of the Week

In Year 5, the children have been working through a unit of work entitled 'Chinese Art'. Amongst other things, they have learnt about how ink can be used effectively to create a piece of work. As part of the unit, the children discovered that bamboo is a common plant in China, and everyone investigated ways of drawing bamboo effectively. Christina produced a fantastic interpretation of a piece of bamboo and took great care when adding the intricate details.
