Get your child to read the book and check to see your child has understood what the text is about. Identify words they are not sure of and explain what they mean. Your child should write a summary of the story/book.	Day 2 Using the 'KS1 English Comprehension – Targeted Question Book' booklet, your child should read the extract on The Selfish Giant on Page 30 and answer questions on Page 31.	Day 3 Read the First News newspaper. Link can be found in the 'Additional learning resources parents may wish to use' section. Allow your children to browse through the newspaper and see if there are any articles they would like to read. Your child may need help reading some of the text.		Day 4 Read the First News article 'Stop Plastic Pollution' . They may find the text challenging and so you may need to help them with some words. Answer the First News article questions. Further Learning Opportunities

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about music. Learning may focus on listening to and performing music and exploring a range of music genres and instruments. Your child will need to complete the activities to support their learning.

• Traditional music around the world - There are lots of different types of music. Types of music are called genres (you say it 'jon-rahs'). How many genres of music do you know? Different genres of music include classical, pop, RnB, rap and folk music. Different music has its roots, or is more popular, in different places around the world. Ask your child to find about music from their own heritage. E.g. The sitar is an instrument traditionally used in Indian music as well as in some other nearby countries. Bhangra is a popular style of music in India. It is very lively and good to dance to. Bhangra has become popular across the world.



- Instruments together- Listen to the programme 'Instruments Together' by using the link below.

 Get your child to design a poster for a concert who will be performing? What instruments will be played?
- Making Music- Task your child with making a variety of shakers. Using empty bottles from the recycling, fill them with different dry foods/things from the garden. Get your child to explore how can they make the shakers sound different? Write a set of instructions for making your own musical shakers. Don't forget to include imperative verbs (bossy words) and time conjunctions (first, next, then, after). https://www.activityvillage.co.uk/homemade-instruments-shaker
- Can you make your own musical instrument? You might want to make a drum, a guitar or something else
 of your own choice. Here are some resources you may want to use:kitchen roll, elastic bands of different thicknesses, plastic or paper cups, boxes of different size, lentils or
 other dried beans, tissue paper, scissors, glue and sellotape.
 Draw a picture of your creation. Can you explain to a family member how you made
 your musical instrument?
- After this, ask your child to design a new instrument. This could be an instrument
 that belongs to the woodwind or brass family. They can draw and label their design
 and then make it using materials from the recycling. Does it work? Ask your child to
 record 3 ways they could improve their design.
- Let's use our bodies to make sounds- Can your child use different parts of their body to make music e.g. clicking fingers, stamping feet? Explore the following activities below:
















• The Four Seasons- Vivaldi wrote The Four Seasons during the early Classical period. Divide a piece of paper into 4 and ask your child to draw a different season in each box (whilst they listen to the music,

using the link below). Discuss how each movement sounds different e.g. Spring is energetic and has a fast tempo. https://www.bbc.co.uk/teach/bring-the-noise/thunder-jam-weather/zk6pxyc



What can I Hear? - Ask your child to visit different places in the home and garden. Get them to list all the
different sounds that they can hear e.g. the humming of the fridge. Which room is the noisiest?
Encourage them to use words such as volume, tempo, pitch and beat. (See below for the meaning of the
words in bold).

volume- means how loud or quiet the music istempo- means how fast or slow the music is.pitch- means how high or low a sound is.beat- means the speed at which a piece of music is played.

After this, ask your child to record the sounds and play them to the family. Can the family guess where the sound is coming from? Alternatively, your child can replicate the sound and the family could guess this way instead.

- **Start singing** Get your child to learn to use the voice expressively and creatively by singing songs and using chants and rhymes by exploring the website below. https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/z4fgrj6
- Reading- read along to the story 'Every Bunny Dance' by Ellie Sandall.

 After reading the story, ask your child to list all the instruments and dances that appeared in the book.
