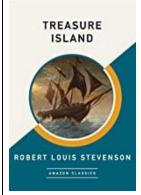
Day 1:

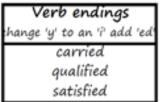

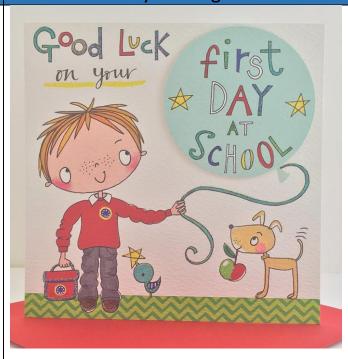
<u>Day 3</u>

<u>Writing Task</u> - Write about your first day at school!

Day 1:

How was your first day at school ...

The writing this week is going to be a recount of your first day at school. You will need to decide whether you want it to be the first day in nursery, infant school, or junior school. It may be easier to choose junior school, and gong into year 3 as there are a lot more things that you can talk about and give advice on. Jot down some ideas for the following:

 Think about your first day at school. Think about the day whole day and summarise into the morning and afternoon - you may not remember everything! You do not within a sentence. You can also find a synonym and antonym for each word.

- need to write everything that happened on the first day as the highlights are enough. Think about what would make the first day easier.
- Think about how you may have felt the day before - what were your thoughts at night? You will need to advise your reader on what the natural things are to feel the day before your first day.
- What were the best moments, the worst moments and the scariest moments? This is important as it will help to guide your reader on how to handlethe first day.

Day 2:

Think about how to structure your writing. Here is a guide that you can use:

- Start your first paragraph based on what you felt the night before and what your thoughts were. Maybe you were really scared about meeting your teacher? Or maybe about the level of schoolwork that you would need to do.
- Move onto the morning. Was your uniform a bit big? Did you have a packed lunch? Maybe brand-new stationery? You will need to talk about the first assembly and seeing all the bigger older kids for the first time - how did you feel?
- For your third paragraph, summarise the whole day. Remember just to summarise the main points and the interesting parts.
- For the final paragraph, reflect on the day. Think about your reader; give advice on someone who may have to go through the same experience. What parts of the day met your expectations? What were you completely wrong about? What were your best and worst memories thinking back now?

Day 3:

Remember these following points:

- Keep your writing in first person and in the past tense.
- Make your writing flow by keeping it simple and to the point. The writing does not need to be too long, but it does need to be informative and clear.
- Make it funny. Your audience is more likely to enjoy reading your writing if it is humorous.

Day 4:

Read through your writing from yesterday. Check your work for spelling and grammatical errors. Uplevel your work by including multi-clause sentences, synonyms and descriptive techniques.

Day 5:

Re-draft your writing by correcting any errors identified from yesterday. Remember, your handwriting should be neat and joined up. Once you have completed your final draft, ask an adult to read your work with you.

Learning Project- to be completed throughout the week: World War 2

This project should be completed throughout the week. It will incorporate a range of different subjects and topics. The focus this week is World War II. As we mark the 75th anniversary of VE day, this work is based around the role of women during the war.

The role of women

The Women's Land Army

The government wanted to increase the amount of food grown within Britain. In order to grow more food, more help was needed on the farms and so the government started the Women's Land Army. The girls of the land army looked after animals, ploughed the fields, dug up potatoes, harvested the crops, killed the rats, dug and hoed for 48 hours a week in the winter and 50 hours a week in the summer.

The Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS)

The ATS was the women's branch of the British Army during World War Two. Women between the ages of 17 and 43 could join and, although they were barred from serving in battle, they could take on other roles, such as cooks, storekeepers, orderlies, drivers and postal workers. Later in the war, when there was a shortage of men available to do some jobs, women in the ATS became radar operators and anti-aircraft gun crew members as well. The most notable member of the ATS during the Second World War was the then Princess Elizabeth.
