


keep you updated and work together to ensure the best possible educational experience for your child.

WMPS Book Fair





UNICEF Article of the Week



This week, pupils across the school have looked at:

Article 28: Access to Education

All children across the world have the right to access primary education for free, and secondary education must be available to every child.

But, just as important is the quality of the education that is received – just being in a school is not enough. Article 28 also speaks of the importance of children being treated with dignity in their school setting. Also, it places additional responsibility for global education on richer countries, as it makes clear that they must help poorer countries to ensure that all children can access their right to education. Children's rights are universal and indivisible and the right to a good quality education is an example of how rights are interdependent. For a child to enjoy a good quality education lots of other rights need to be accessed too – health, for example. You can't learn effectively if you are unwell.

Pupils across the school focused on the question, 'Why education is so important for children and young people?' Staff and pupils have discussed the importance of education and how it supports other articles of the Convention. All children have the right to learn.


Families with children due to start secondary school in September 2025 are now able to apply online for secondary school places. The deadline for applications is 31 October 2024 and places will be offered on 3 March 2025.

It is particularly important that families carefully consider the school's admission criteria and name at least one school on their application where their child would have been offered a place in previous years. Please be aware of the deadline as parents who apply late are less likely to be offered one of their preferred schools.

WMPS Attendance Stats

Over a school year, we are due to be open for 190 days, which equates to 380 sessions. Registration takes place at 8.50am in the morning and after lunch in the afternoon. Attendance is affected if a pupil is not present at school for any whole session including registration.




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Mr Panichi's Book of the Week

Where Will the Sleepy Sheep Sleep? - David Metzenthen & Jonathan Bentley (Illustrator)

This delightful and funny book employs rhythmic rhymes and clever wordplay to captivate young readers as they follow a sleepy sheep in search of the perfect resting spot. The interactive question-and-answer style encourages children to experiment with tongue twisters, alliteration, and assonance, helping them expand their vocabulary and improve word recognition. Jonathon Bentley's illustrations depict a sheep whose eyelids grow increasingly heavy, reflecting the deepening colours of the evening sky and surroundings. This charming story is ideal for bedtime

reading with little ones, and it also lends itself to engaging craft activities.

Upper School


October, October - Katya Balen & Angela Harding (Illustrator)


Liyana Y4.2
