Diwali Assembly

Year 6 led a wonderful assembly this morning celebrating Diwali. The epic story of Rama and Sita, their 14-year exodus, the battle with demon king Ravana, and their victorious return was all re-told. There was plenty of singing, adventure and battles, all set against a colourful backdrop. The assembly ended with a traditional Indian stick dance and the lighting of lamps.

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DT Day

Our topic in **Nursery** this half term is 'All About Me'. we have been learning all about ourselves, our families and the area in which we live. We have been learning about different kinds of houses. For DT day, we used junk materials to create houses.





The children in **Reception** have designed and made pumpkin soup for DT day. They learnt the importance of each ingredient and developed their fine motor skills by cutting a range of different vegetables for their soup. All the children enjoyed eating their pumpkin soup: "it was delicious"!





During DT day, **Year 1** made jam tarts. The children discussed the recipe and designed their jam tarts before making them. They all worked as a team to sort, measure and prepare the ingredients. Each child had the opportunity to mix, roll and cut their dough before adding jam to their tarts. Once the jam tarts were cooked the children tasted them and evaluated them. The children enjoyed the day and were all very excited to have the chance at becoming a chef for the day. The jam tarts were very tasty, and all the children should be very proud of themselves

Run, run as fast as you can... you can't catch me I am the ginger bread man... but Year 2 did! **Year 2** became bakers for the day... The children got stuck in and began their day researching about the origin of gingerbread and understanding that ginger is a spice.

The fun began when the fingers came out to pour the flour and mix the ingredients together, the flour was everywhere but so were the smiles. The smell of the gingerbread lingered throughout the corridors which left mouths watering. The children thoroughly enjoyed icing their gingerbread friends and adding many sweet treats. The gingerbread was scrumptious and the day was sweet!





In **Year 3**, the children honed their sewing skills by designing and creating beautiful stuffed bauble decorations. Whether for a Christmas gift or a personal keepsake, each child worked hard to bring their designs to life. Though the task was tricky at times, everyone enjoyed the challenge and got to practice this invaluable skill while having lots of fun!

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Our **Year 4** pupils had a blast on their
Design and Technology day, turning their
imaginations into reality! After researching various cushion
designs and purposes, the children embarked on a creative
journey using appliqué. They skilfully added their designs or
patterns to their cushions using a whipstitch, showcasing their
artistic flair. Next, they expertly sewed the front and back
pieces together using a running stitch. Before filling their
cushions with soft stuffing. They finished their creations with
a backstitch, ensuring a neat and professional look. This
hands-on activity not only fostered creativity but also
enhanced the children's fine motor skills and provided a
therapeutic end to the half-term.

On DT Day, **Year 5** researched, designed, made and evaluated cam toys. The children learnt how different types of mechanisms can be used to make a cam toy work effectively and had the opportunity to put their learning into practice. Everyone had lots of fun assembling their cam toys and were very creative with their designs.





WMPS Book Fair

It was that exciting time of the year again when the Book Fair came to school. Last year's Book Fair was so popular and loved by pupils, parents and teachers alike that we just had to get the Primary Books people back in. Again, we didn't just have a book fair. We went even bigger. We hosted a Book Event. For three whole days, children attended storytelling workshops based around the themes of Australia and Polynesia. They got to sing songs, converse and even dress up in traditional Australian/Polynesian attire before hearing a traditional story. The children thoroughly enjoyed it and this was evident with the long queues of children waiting every day after school to purchase new books.

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Thank you to all of you who helped support it. It was a great few days and the children and the school got a lot of out of it. Thanks to your help, the school has been able to buy over £600 worth of books which we will now be able to use to further support lessons for all children.

UK Health Security Agency

Norovirus, also called the "winter vomiting bug", is a stomach bug that causes vomiting and diarrhoea. It can be very unpleasant, but usually goes away in about 2 days.

The main symptoms of norovirus are:

- feeling sick (nausea)
- diarrhoea
- being sick (vomiting)

You may also have:

- a high temperature
- a headache
- · aching arms and legs

The symptoms start suddenly within 1 to 2 days of being infected.

You can usually treat yourself or your child at home.

The most important thing is to rest and have lots of fluids to avoid dehydration.

You will usually start to feel better in 2 to 3 days.

Protect others from norovirus by washing your hands regularly with soap and warm water, especially before preparing food and after going to the toilet. Alcohol gels do not kill norovirus, so it is important to wash hands regularly.

SMART Internet Rules

Over half term, it is likely children will be spending more time than usual on their tablets and other devices. Do help them to stay safe when using the internet and technology by making sure they are showing you what they are doing. We teach children to stay safe by never sharing any information with people they don't know, even if they say they are another child and always telling an adult about anything that makes them feel uncomfortable. If you would like any support with setting up child locks or firewalls to prevent children accessing adult material, do let us know. 


WMPS Attendance Stats

Mister and Missis take the final leaf from the village's enchanted callaloo plant, hoping for a child. Their dream comes true with the arrival of their sweet-natured daughter, Lou, whose stunning Afro curls reach towards the sky. Tragically, Lou is soon captured and held captive by a malevolent man...

This retelling of the classic fairy tale, Rapunzel, draws inspiration from tales shared with the author, Trish Cooke, about enslaved Africans who wove patterns into their cornrowed hair to create escape maps. Sophie Bass's vibrant illustrations add a captivating visual element. Suitable for ages 5 and up.

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
Upper School

This story follows Xanthe, a history enthusiast, as she embarks on a journey to uncover hidden treasures. Guided by a mysterious cat, Xanthe discovers clues about her Nani's life back in Africa. It's a touching tale that aims to help Nani remember. I recommend this book for children in Year 4 and up.
