Extreme Weather Policy

Every winter brings the possibility of snow and ice. Extreme bad weather can cause widespread and prolonged disruption. Schools are often affected and it can be difficult to maintain an education service. As a fundamental principle every effort is made to keep the school open, even if only limited numbers of pupils can attend. However, schools may close due to 'unavoidable' circumstances. Those circumstances being that it is no longer safe for staff or pupils to be onsite. We recognise that it is important our school remains open so parents are able to work and pupils can continue to learn. William Murdoch Primary School will make every effort to prepare for severe snow/ice this winter by gritting pathways and clearing access points.



With the possibility of adverse weather around the corner, I wanted to remind you of our Extreme Weather Policy. Communication is key in such circumstances. Should we experience any extreme winter weather, we will communicate our plans with you via Class Dojo, email, the school website homepage and our X feed. If the school cannot open, we will give you as much notice as possible. In such circumstances, please do not ring the school telephone as these lines must be kept clear for school leaders to communicate with staff and other agencies.

Should it snow or there be a heavy frost, it may be sensible and practical for us to focus our attention on clearing one safe route onto the school site and into the building. Again, if this is the case, we will communicate it with you.

If there is snow, school leaders will decide whether it is safe or not for children to play outside. Pupils will only be allowed out to play during the school day if they have a warm coat and a change of socks, shoes and trousers.

If we have to close the school, we would do so because of one of the following reasons:

- Inadequate heating
- No meals available
- No water available
- Insufficient supervision
- Whether there is likely to be a change to circumstances that will impact on the above

Due to the improvements in our remote learning, in the event of a school closure, we will set work to allow children to learn from home. If the school has to close early, under no circumstances will children be allowed to leave without an adult. Only parents or a person named as an emergency contact will be allowed to collect a child.

During cold weather children need to wear suitable warm clothing including a winter coat, hats, gloves and shoes/wellies.



Newsletters

Today pupils were given a hard copy of the termly newsletter which details the topics they will be covering in each subject this term. It is good practice for children to do some background reading on topics that they will be studying. A soft copy of the newsletter is available from the school website and Class Dojo.

Poetry by Heart

'Learning poetry by heart can, literally, transform you'- Gyles Brandreth.

As a school we are championing the benefits of learning poetry by heart. Research carried out by the Memory Laboratory at the University of Cambridge showed how learning and speaking poetry benefits both younger and older people. In young children, engaging with poetry can improve the speed at which they learn to speak, read and write. It can improve academic performance, concentration and even support better sleep. For adults, the evidence shows that learning poetry by heart improves the ability to communicate, improves memory, increases brain capacity and keeps dementia at bay.

Poetry can make you laugh and cry. Poetry can make you think and feel. Poetry can teach you, and sustain you, and surprise you. Learning poetry by heart can, literally, transform you. Children throughout the school will be learning poems off by heart and performing them out loud. Attached you will find the poems children in each year group will be learning. It would be of great benefit to you and your child if you could learn them together.

The school has again registered for the prestigious Poetry By Heart national competition. Last year Maya in Y5.1 gave an amazing poetry performance at the Globe Theatre in London. Please keep an eye out in the upcoming weekly newsletters for more information on the Poetry By Heart competition.


Holocaust Memorial Day is promoted and supported by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust.

WMPS Attendance Stats



Lower School



Troll Stinks - Jeanne Willis & Tony Ross (Illustrator)

Troll Stinks is a timely and engaging book for today's children, offering both entertainment and meaningful lessons. Billy the Goat and his friend Cyril find a phone and decide to send mean messages to the troll under the bridge, only to discover the emotional harm their actions cause.

Part of a series that reimagines traditional tales in a modern context, the book explores the impact of technology on children's safety. With more primary-aged children using online messaging,


it provides an excellent springboard for discussions on bullying, empathy, and the power of words. Even for younger children not yet using devices, its themes of kindness and accountability are universally relevant.

This important and entertaining story is a must-read for fostering empathy and understanding in the digital age.

Upper School

Robots: Explore the World of Robotics and AI- Henny Admoni and Amy Grimes (Illustrator)

Colourfully illustrated, 'Robots' offers an engaging exploration of robotics, starting with a surprising timeline of their history. It explains what robots are, how they differ from AI, and how various types of robots function - from those helping the environment to ones used in farming and mobility. The book highlights the diverse roles robots play, from assisting in factories to supporting hospitals, and delves into the ethics of robotics and future possibilities.





Perfect for KS2, this book is an excellent resource as AI and robotics become increasingly relevant in everyday life.



Mr Slinn's Artist of the Week





Reception Children

In Reception the children have been learning about landscapes and how different artists can show landscapes in a range of creative ways. The work of David Hockney was explored in great depth and the children explored how he used colour and shape to create different types of landscape. After doing lots of research, Reception produced their own colourful landscape paintings and the results were incredible. Avneet, Chaniya and Sukhmani showcased their artistic skills very well through their creations.

Manat Y4.1

During Year 4's recent topic they have been learning how artists use colour and detail to show depth in a piece of work. The children learnt that artists use colour to show depth in a painting by often putting darker colours in the foreground and lighter colours in the background. Year 4 found out that artists often use the most detail in the foreground because it is closer to the viewer's eye. The children used a range of images of landscapes and created their own landscape scenes using a wide range of materials. Manat produced an excellent piece of work with great attention to detail. She used light and dark tones to help produce a three-dimensional effect.
