Dear Parents/Carers

It was wonderful to see so many parents on Monday and Wednesday of this week for Lower School and Upper School Parents' Evening respectively. I would like to pass on my thanks to all parents who completed the questionnaire, which is based on the Ofsted model questions on Parent View. The questionnaires will be analysed over the next few weeks and I will share the results of the survey in due course. I would like to pass on my thanks to all staff who supported the Parents' Evenings, with a special mention to Mr Slinn for organising the art displays and Mr Blackmore for arranging the music performances.









Parents' Evening highlights the partnership that is required between parents and school in helping children to progress to the very best of their ability. With this in mind, it is important that all adults model to children that learning is a lifelong passion and something that never stops. This can be done in a number of ways. For example:





- Talk to your child about what you are learning about at the moment.
- Read books, newspapers and magazines in front of your child.
- If you can't answer a question that your child asks you (which very often happens to me when my niece asks me about the intricacies of space, i.e. how many stars are there in the sky? How far would you have to dig to get to the centre of the Earth? Or, when can I go to the moon?), research the answer together and show your child that you are curious to find out the answer.
- Model asking questions and then finding out the answers, i.e. as you walk through the park, ask aloud: What do you think that squirrel is eating? In Autumn, why do some leaves turn red, while others turn yellow? Why does my shadow look different to how it did this morning?

Our staff have a number of training days each year and two hours of in-service training each week. As I said, *learning is a lifelong passion and something that never stops!*

In what can only be described as another eventful week, the school has been a hive of learning and activity, both indoors and outdoors. Children in both Upper School and Lower School have received an array of enrichment activities with specialised instruction from coaches with the Aston Villa Foundation and from Warwickshire Cricket Club, as well as some amazing science workshops as part of Science Week celebrations in school (more on that later in the newsletter).

A special thank you to parents in Year 6 who attended the SATs workshops this week, and to Mr Desai for leading the workshops.

Next week will see the return of Mrs Gill, who this time last year started her maternity leave. She has enjoyed a beautiful journey into motherhood during her maternity leave and baby Ashleen is a joy to behold. I am sure you will give her a warm welcome back to the school community.

Year 6 Secondary School Allocations

If you are the parent/carer of a child in Year 6, you should have received an offer email and letter naming the secondary school your child has been offered for entry in September 2025. You **do not** need to contact Birmingham School Admissions if you intend to accept your child's offer of a school place.

You only need to inform School Admissions if you are **refusing** the school place your child was offered, and this must be done by **Friday 21 March 2025**. Details of how to do this was included in your offer letter. If they are not informed by this date that you wish to refuse your offer, the secondary school will update their records to show the offer has been accepted.

We strongly encourage you to accept your offer, this is so your child has a guaranteed school place to attend in September 2025.

By refusing your offer, please be aware that your child' school place may be offered out to another child from that school's waiting list once they are made available. Your child will have **no school** to attend in September as School Admissions only make one school offer to a child. If a family refuses their school offer, they are not required to offer your child a place at an alternative school. Your child will only be offered a place at another school if a place becomes available on the waiting list for one of your higher preferred schools due to waiting list movement, or if you appeal against the decision to refuse your child a place at one of your preferred schools and your appeal is subsequently upheld (successful).

The offer being accepted will not affect your child's waiting list position for any of your higher preference schools, or influence the outcome of any appeal you may submit.

If your child has not been offered a place at any of the schools that you applied for, this will be because the school(s) you applied for have received more applications than there were places available, and other children that better met the admission criteria were offered those places. 


Rainbow Village - Emmi Smid

In a world where individuals keep to themselves, an unforeseen visitor compels them to form new relationships and recognise the significance of learning from one another.

Emmi Smid crafts an enchanting realm filled with quirky and delightful characters, guaranteed to bring joy to readers. The vivid, dynamic illustrations breathe life into this world, masterfully depicting the transformative power of human connection through the expressive use of colour.

This is a book that, despite being less frequently highlighted over the years, remains an underrated treasure. It serves as a fantastic resource for exploring themes of diversity, inclusion, and the importance of acceptance, particularly for children in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) and Key Stage 1.

The Adventures of Rap Kid - MC Grammar

Z—short for Zero, as he never speaks at school—is often bullied and left out. His love for rapping makes everyday conversation tricky since he tends to speak in rhyme, sometimes landing him in trouble. But when Mr. G, a teacher who seems to understand him, introduces him to a new student, Essef—short for SFX—things start to change. Like Z, she prefers not to talk, instead communicating through phrases displayed on her decorative jacket badges. The two quickly form a bond, especially when Mr. G encourages them to audition as a duo for the upcoming Rap Rumble competition. However, standing in their way is Z's biggest adversary—Bully Boy.

The book follows a simple storyline, with much of the narrative consisting of Z directly addressing the reader, whom he calls 'my G.' It includes plenty of humour aimed at younger readers, such as nose-picking antics and some toilet humour.

Themes of friendship, acceptance and bullying run throughout the story. The book features a main character who wears a hijab, explores different family dynamics (including separated parents), and positively acknowledges diverse family structures.

This is best suited for independent reading. When reading aloud, an adult would need a strong grasp of rap and street slang—such as sick, bro/bruh, garms, and barz—to do the story justice. One of the later chapters encourages reading, emphasising that aspiring rappers need a rich vocabulary to craft rhymes about their interests. 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create their own rap lyrics, along with tips and guidance on writing raps. This is a really charming book that you children won't want to put down!
