MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents/Carers,

A key component of our education offer revolves around bridging the word gap. At William Murdoch Primary School, we are dedicated to tackling social inequality by ensuring that every child has the chance to experience 'the best that is' in our world. A key part of this mission is our emphasis on developing cultural capital and expanding vocabulary across all subjects. By introducing students to the vital knowledge and creativity that form the foundation of an educated society, we help them recognise human accomplishments and reach their full potential.

Studies show that a 'word gap' can emerge between disadvantaged children and their peers even before they enter school, with serious consequences for literacy, academic achievement, behaviour, and mental health. To close this gap, we prioritise phonics and reading instruction, nurture a love for language, and actively involve parents in supporting their children's education. Our curriculum includes high-quality texts, guided reading, phonics and spelling programmes, and a structured approach to vocabulary development that includes explicit teaching of Tier 2 and Tier 3 words.

We are equally passionate about celebrating diversity and exploring the richness of ethnic, cultural, and linguistic traditions in both our school and the wider community. Through carefully designed lessons, literature and art, we inspire students to appreciate diversity and embrace inclusivity.

I have written on a number of occasions on the importance of reading. It is the cornerstone of the curriculum offer at William Murdoch and we look for every opportunity to build reading fluency. Did you know that by simply turning on subtitles when watching programmes means your child will read a staggering number of words? Put them on and your child will read the equivalent number of words that are in all the Harry Potter books, all of the Lord of the Rings, all of the Chronicles of Narnia and everything Roald Dahl wrote, combined!



Research has shown that it can double the chance of your child leaving school as a proficient reader. You can turn them on for the whole family or most streaming services will now allow you to do it just for children's profiles. Perhaps, after all, there is a magic button...

Parental Concerns

If you have any concerns about your child or feel that you need to speak to someone about their learning, behaviour or anything else you feel is important, please make sure that your first port of call is their teacher. This will be the person who knows your child best and is most likely to be able to help you. You can see the teacher at the end of the day when children are being dismissed or contact them through Class Dojo (please allow up to 48 hours for a response). Should you need further help, each year group has a Team Leader who will also know your child well and will be able to help. Team Leaders take responsibility for all aspects of the children's learning and behaviour within their year

Making Rights Happen

The Convention on the Rights of the Child brings together a range of rights that all children aged under 18 are entitled to, no matter who they are or where they are born. These rights ensure that all children are given the support they need to develop and reach their potential and are protected from harm. Governments across the world have signed up to the CRC and have promised to make the rights within the CRC a reality for children in their country and a number of articles specifically mention what governments must do to make rights happen.











Article 1 makes clear that everyone under the age of 18 has all the rights in the Convention.

Article 4 states that governments must do all they can to make sure every child can enjoy their rights by creating systems and passing laws that promote and protect children's rights.


Article 41 states that if a country has laws and standards that go further than the present Convention, then the country must keep these laws.




