Your opinion really matters to us and there have been a number of changes made to the way school operates following suggestions from parents and children.

Year 6 Secondary School Allocations

If you are the parent/carer of a child in Year 6, you should have received an offer email and letter naming the secondary school your child has been offered for entry in September 2025. You **do not** need to contact Birmingham School Admissions if you intend to accept your child's offer of a school place.



We strongly encourage you to accept your offer, this is so your child has a guaranteed school place to attend in September 2025.

By refusing your offer, please be aware that your child' school place may be offered out to another child from that school's waiting list once they are made available. Your child will have **no school** to attend in September as School Admissions only make one school offer to a child. If a family refuses their school offer, they are not required to offer your child a place at an alternative school. Your child will only be offered a place at another school if a place becomes available on the waiting list for one of your higher preferred schools due to waiting list movement, or if you appeal against the decision to refuse your child a place at one of your preferred schools and your appeal is subsequently upheld (successful).

The offer being accepted will not affect your child's waiting list position for any of your higher preference schools, or influence the outcome of any appeal you may submit.

If your child has not been offered a place at any of the schools that you applied for, this will be because the school(s) you applied for have received more applications than there were places available, and other children that better met the admission criteria were offered those places. World Book Day

This week pupils across the school have focused on World Book Day which covered three articles, which are Articles 17, 29 and 31. World Book Day was created by UNESCO on 23 April 1995 as a worldwide celebration of books and reading. In countries around the world it is celebrated on the anniversary of that date, but in the UK, it is generally marked on the first Thursday of March. This week's activities link to the following articles:







Article 17 (access to information from the media): Every child has the right to reliable information from a variety of sources, and governments should encourage the media to provide information that children can understand. Governments must help protect children from materials that could harm them.




Article 29 (goals of education): Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures and the environment.



Article 31 (leisure, play and culture): Every child has the right to relax, play and take part in a wide range of cultural and artistic activities.




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Mr Panichi's Book of the Week

around her is too occupied! As she wanders from house to house, she finds families busy with festive preparations— hanging decorations, cooking delicious meals, wrapping presents, trying on new outfits, and decorating their hands with intricate henna designs.


Full of curiosity and mischief, Nylah gets caught up in all the excitement, but her 'help' isn't exactly welcomed. 'Poor Nylah!' Eventually, after being sent back home, she dozes off—only to be woken at dawn for a grand celebration! It is then that she

finally understands what all the activity was leading up to, as the community gathers for a joyous Eid festival in the park, where this time, everyone is ready to play.

With its vibrant depiction of diverse Muslim families and a strong sense of togetherness, this story beautifully captures the spirit of Eid. The additional author's notes at the end provide further insight, making this a fantastic introduction to the celebration for EYFS and KS1 readers.



Upper School



The Great Theatre Rescue - Judith Eagle

Set in the early 1900s, this immersive historical novel transports readers to the lively and chaotic world of London's theatre scene, blending rich period detail with an exhilarating storyline. Charley, the spirited and charismatic protagonist, is as dazzling as the city's stage lights.

Her journey unfolds against the backdrop of a dramatic transformation—escaping a dreadful girls' boarding school, navigating a challenging return journey from the south coast to London, and outwitting a cunning criminal with a Fagin-like presence. Along the way, she discovers unexpected friendships, unearths hidden family secrets, and finds the courage to overcome her fears.

Echoing the themes of Dickens, the novel paints a vivid picture of London's sharp social divides and the winding streets of its theatre district. Readers experience the dawn of a new era—

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marked by the arrival of electric lights and legendary performers like Duke Ellington. With a dynamic protagonist, a thrilling plot, and a richly atmospheric setting, this novel is a compelling read that's difficult to put down.



Mr Slinn's Artist of the Week

Noor (Nursery)

Within the topic 'Growing and Changing' the children in Nursery have been learning about the four different seasons. As a cohort, everyone read the story 'Seasons come, seasons go. Tree' and lots of time was spent thinking about how nature, in particular trees, change across the seasons. Nursery looked at trees within their environment and created paintings representing a season of their choice.



Monuments of Ancient Rome (Y4.1)

Over the last few lessons the children in Year 4 have been learning about Ancient Rome and many famous Ancient Roman buildings. One building that was investigated in depth was The Pantheon, a Roman temple. The children learnt that the dome of the Pantheon is made of concrete and it is the largest unreinforced concrete dome in the world. The children also learnt that many people, including kings, are buried in The Pantheon. Year 4 drew pictures of The Pantheon and created three dimensional models of the building. Year 4 produced excellent constructions with great attention to detail.
