

The only homework that will be marked regularly in school is spellings, knowledge organiser quizzes and Maths. We also encourage daily reading (at least 20 minutes a day).

Black History Month

This week's article of the week has focused on Black History Month. Black History Month takes place in October every year and is a celebration of key figures and events in Black history. Having begun in the USA, it has been celebrated in the UK since 1987, with the emphasis on celebrating particularly the history and contributions to society of people with an African or Caribbean heritage.

There is a different theme every year, for example in 2022 the theme 'Time for Change: Action Not Words' highlights the importance of being an ally and coming together around shared common goals to achieve a better world for everyone. The theme for 2023, is 'Black Resistance', recognising the ways in which Black people have resisted oppression, discrimination and prejudice throughout history.

Pupils across the school have looked at article 2 which is non-discrimination and the Convention applies to every child without discrimination, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status, whatever they think or say, whatever their family background.



Article 30 which is children from minority or indigenous groups, and focuses on how every child has the right to learn and use the language, customs and religion of their family, whether or not these are shared by the majority of the people in the country where they live.



Attendance

Attendance has been very good so far this term. Thank you for your help in making sure that your children attend school and arrive on time. Although we continue to maintain a soft start to the day, punctuality is vitally important. All school doors close at 8.50am. Any children arriving after that time will need to enter via the Main Office and will be signed in as late. Children undertake important learning first thing in the morning and it can be unsettling for children who arrive late. If your child is unable to attend school, it is extremely important that you inform the school of this before 9.00am on the day of absence. Please either email the school at enquiry@williammurdoch.bham.sch.uk or leave a message on the absence line, giving your child's name, class and a brief reason for absence. If we are not informed of a reason for an absence, it will be recorded as unauthorised.

Please also arrive promptly to collect your child(ren) at the end of the day.

If your child is booked on a club and will not be attending for any reason, it is really important that you, and not your child, speak to a member of the office staff before the club is due to start. This is for safeguarding reasons. Thank you in advance for your cooperation and support.


Nursery/Reception Places for September 2025

You will be aware that your child is due to transfer to secondary school in September 2026. The school has shared an information letter from the Local Authority for parents/carers on how to apply online.




WMPS Attendance Stats

Mr Panichi's Book of the Week

Lower School




The Mushroom of Doom! – Becky Davies & Thomas Elliott (Illustrator)

This picture book is a brilliantly clever creation, brimming with humour on every page, both in its witty text and its expressive illustrations.

At its heart, it's a tale of revenge and the futility of holding grudges, told with a playful twist that adults will appreciate just as much as children. With nods to classic Bond villains and a generous dose of wordplay (he's not just the Mushroom of Doom—he's also a "fun guy"), the story is packed with clever references and laugh-out-loud moments. The illustrations perfectly match the quirky narrative, and giving mushrooms such vivid, individual personalities is no small feat.

The ending is delightfully ambiguous, sparking conversation and interpretation. The Mushroom himself is a wonderfully exaggerated villain, one who may or may not face justice, and who seems stubbornly resistant to learning from the kindness shown to him. It's rare to find a picture book that genuinely makes people laugh out loud, but this one will. The concept of a villainous mushroom is irresistibly intriguing, and the execution is every bit as entertaining as the premise promises.

Upper School



The Amazing Book of World Mythology – Stella Caldwell

Stella Caldwell's Amazing Book of World Mythology presents short, engaging retellings of myths from across the globe in a way that's easy to access and enjoy.

One of the book's most refreshing features is its thematic organisation. Rather than grouping stories by region, it arranges them by shared themes, highlighting the universal nature of storytelling and the connections between cultures.

Each of the six chapters contains four or five stories that can be read independently, making them ideal for reading aloud as a quick bedtime tale. At the end of each chapter, a double-page spread introduces additional stories, characters, or objects related to the theme, reinforcing the global parallels in myth and legend.

Visually, the book is a treat. Each myth is illustrated by a different artist, and this diversity in style adds richness and


depth to the reading experience. The variety of artistic voices is a key reason the book feels so expansive and inclusive.

With its compelling storytelling, vibrant illustrations, and wide-ranging content, this is a book every child should have the chance to explore. It's a fantastic addition to any KS2 child's home library.

Mr Slinn's Artist of the Week

Hafsa - Y1.2

During the first half term in Year 1 the children have been using the primary colours (red, yellow and blue) to create pieces of art work. The children looked at the work of many artists and discussed how they used primary colours and shapes in their work. The children had a go at creating their own art work in a similar style to the work of Mondrian. Hafsa worked well with the primary colours and applied the paint incredibly carefully to produce a vivid and exciting piece of art!

In Year 3 the children have been thinking about how artists incorporate printing into their practice. Time was spent discussing a selection of art pieces and the children analysed the effectiveness of different printing techniques in art work. Year 3 were tasked with producing their own prints and the outcomes were excellent! Abdullah produced an outstanding print of a flower and made an effort to add intricate detail to his print.
