DT Day

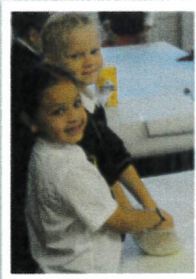
Our topic in **Nursery** this half term is 'All About Me'. We have been learning all about ourselves, our families and the area in which we live. We have been learning about different kinds of houses. For DT day, we used junk materials to create houses.



The children in **Reception** have designed and made pumpkin soup for DT day. They learnt the importance of what ingredients were and developed their fine motor skills by cutting a range of different vegetables for their soup. All the children enjoyed eating their pumpkin soup: "it was delicious"!



Year 1



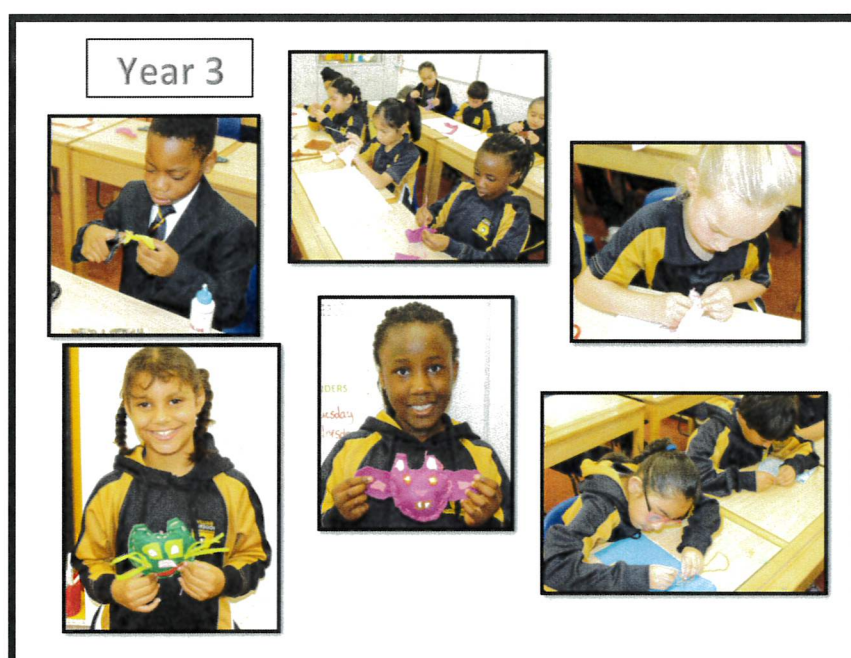
During DT day, **Year 1** made jam tarts. The children discussed the recipe and designed their jam tarts before making them. They all worked as a team to sort, measure and prepare the ingredients. Each child had the opportunity to mix, roll and cut their dough before adding jam to their tarts. Once the jam tarts were cooked the children tasted and evaluated them. The children enjoyed the day and were all very excited to have the chance at becoming a chef for the day. The jam tarts were very tasty, and all the children should be very proud of themselves.

Year 2 became bakers for the day... The children got stuck in and began their day researching about the origin of gingerbread and understanding that ginger is a spice. The smell of the gingerbread lingered throughout the corridors, which left mouths watering. The children thoroughly enjoyed icing their gingerbread friends and adding many sweet treats. In **Year 3**, the children honed their sewing skills by designing and creating beautiful stuffed bauble decorations. Whether for a Christmas gift or a personal keepsake, each child worked hard to bring their designs to life. Though the task was tricky at times, everyone enjoyed the challenge and got to practice this invaluable skill while having lots of fun!



Our **Year 4** pupils had a blast on their Design and Technology day, turning their imaginations into reality! After researching various cushion designs and purposes, the children embarked on a creative journey using appliqué. They skilfully added their designs or patterns to their cushions using a whipstitch, showcasing their artistic flair. Next, they expertly sewed the front and back pieces together using a running stitch. Before filling their cushions with soft stuffing. They finished their creations with a backstitch, ensuring a neat and professional look. This hands-on activity not only fostered creativity but also enhanced the children's fine motor skills and provided a therapeutic end to the half-term.

The children in **Year 5** have been creating bags as their DT task for this half-term. Time was spent researching different types of bags and considering the differing properties of each. Once the children had done some research they then created a design for a bag of their own. Year 5 thought about how materials could be used in an effective way to produce their bag. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed making their bags and the final results were great. Materials were used thoughtfully and the children ensured that their bags would be fit for purpose.

Year 6 worked in groups to make a water wall. They carefully looked at each other's designs and decided which elements to take from each of them to make the wall. The containers that were used were attached to a plastic mesh which was tied/suspended from another structure such as a fence/wall. The water travelled downwards through the tubes and was collected at the bottom. We were all so proud of our purposeful water walls!

Again this year, we recreated a full-scale Book Event that lasted over three days.

They sang, chatted, and dressed in traditional outfits before listening to stories from these regions. The excitement was clear, with long lines of children eagerly waiting after school each day to buy new books. We're incredibly thankful to everyone who helped make this event possible. It was a fantastic experience for the children and the school as a whole. Thanks to your support, we've been able to purchase over £600 worth of books, which will now be used to enrich lessons and learning for all pupils.

I would like to express my heartfelt thanks for the very generous donations that we have received in school, this week and last. The donations have been shared with the Handsworth Association of Schools.



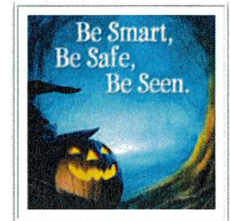


Clocks Go Back

School Meals

Measles Information & Advice

There has been a recent increase in Measles cases across the West Midlands. Measles is highly infectious and can lead to serious health complications, especially in children under 1, pregnant women, and people with a weakened immune system. Outbreaks can happen when not enough people have been immunised.

UK Health Security Agency

Norovirus, also called the "winter vomiting bug", is a stomach bug that causes vomiting and diarrhoea. It can be very unpleasant, but usually goes away in about 2 days.

The main symptoms of norovirus are:

- feeling sick (nausea)
- diarrhoea
- being sick (vomiting)

You may also have:

- a high temperature
- a headache
- aching arms and legs

The symptoms start suddenly within 1 to 2 days of being infected.

You can usually treat yourself or your child at home. The most important thing is to rest and have lots of fluids to avoid dehydration. You will usually start to feel better in 2 to 3 days.

Protect others from norovirus by washing your hands regularly with soap and warm water, especially before preparing food and after going to the toilet. Alcohol gels do not kill norovirus, so it is important to wash hands regularly.



SMART Internet Rules

Over half term, it is likely children will be spending more time than usual on their tablets and other devices. Do help them to stay safe when using the internet and technology by making sure they are showing you what they are doing. We teach children to stay safe by never sharing any information with people they don't know, even if they say they are another child and always telling an adult about anything that makes them feel uncomfortable. Homework is a staple of school life, and of home life. After all, almost every one of us will have done homework ourselves as a child and most of us will be drafted in to help with it at some point as a parent, carer or grandparent. Although schools are not *obliged* to set homework, and some don't, at WMPS we set daily homework and expect children to do it.

The only homework that will be marked regularly in school is spellings, knowledge organiser quizzes and Maths. We also encourage daily reading (at least 20 minutes a day).

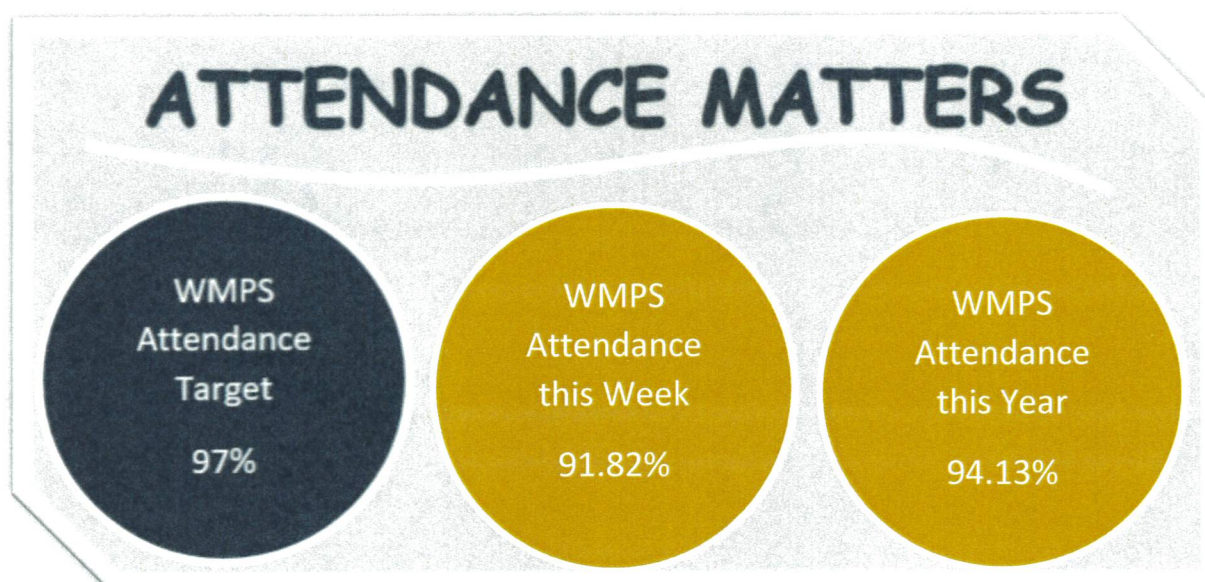

them, protection so they are safe from abuse and neglect and a good standard of living. We also looked at all the things they are looking forward to learning and experiencing in the future.

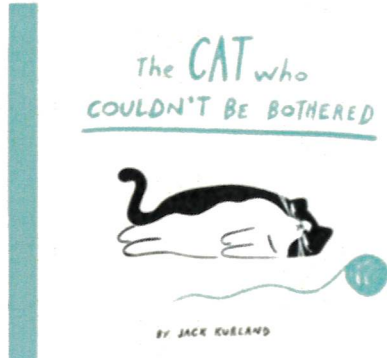
WMPS Attendance Stats

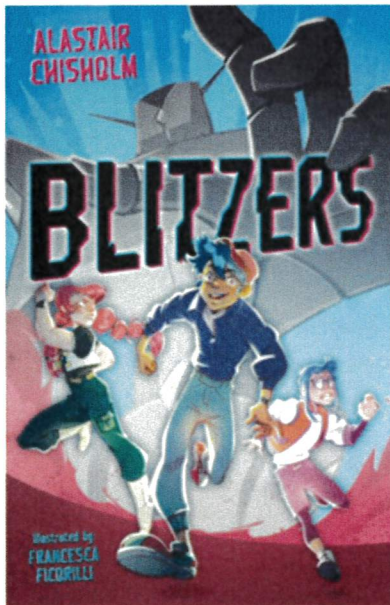
The Cat Who Couldn't Be Bothered – Jack Kurland

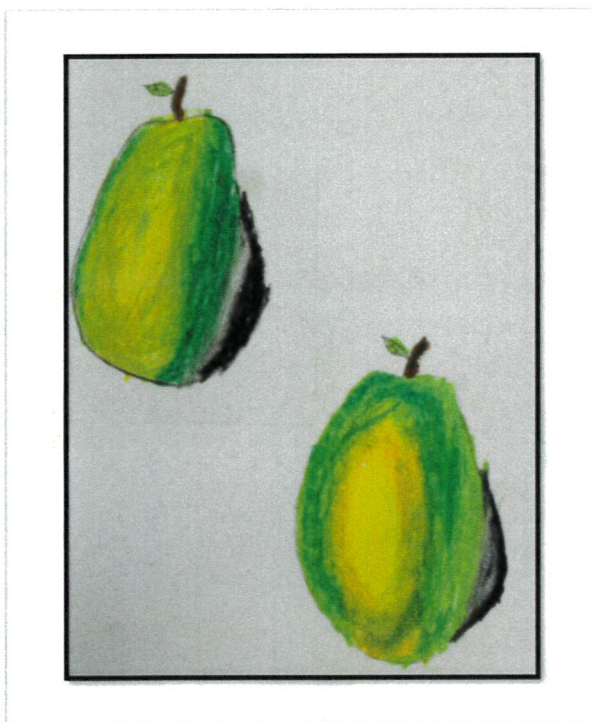




David Y5.2
